Crews News

Charles S.Dohm (5/45 - 6/46) of Turlock, CA wrote to the president on March 25 that there was an article in the July 9, 1945 Life Magazine that the USS Bunker Hill was hit by a Japanese kamakazi on May 11,1945 around 9 AM and he knows firsthand because he was there. (Ed.Note: One of the photos that was donated to the Sperry several years ago shows the Bunker Hill just after she was hit. The Sperry can be seen alongside the Bunker Hill providing damage control and rescuing sailors who were thrown overboard by the explosion.)

Lyle Miller (5/45 -'47) submitted the following story about his naval career. "The Sperry was my third ship and I was part of the initial crew that reported aboard while she was being built and outfitted in the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company in Kearney, New Jersey. I stayed aboard the Sperry until 1947, at which time she was in Algiers Naval Station in New Orleans. I remember my original Chief named Carter, a Watertender (CWT), who had almost twenty years in the Navy. The original Chief Engineer was Lt. Dennison and his successor was Lt. E.W. Osman. During conversations with Carter, I learned he had some harrowing wartime experiences, and was not planning on going to sea aboard the Sperry. Under the assumption he was "shell-shocked", he checked himself into the naval hospital. That made me the leading petty officer of B Division. After commissioning in the Brooklyn Navy Yard and the shakedown cruise we left for the West Coast, where, if I remember correctly, we picked up a replacement for Chief Carter. As hard as I tried I could never remember his name until I read the list of personnel who had received awards in one of the Sperry newsletters. His name was Duard E. Wilson, CWT. He was the one who recommended me for Chief. Does anyone have his address or phone number? He would be about 88 or 89. I've tried Intellius and other sources that I thought would lead me to him. Each time I struck out. Now, wasn't that a nice long story just to get information about one name? Something that could have been said in about five lines."

Another e-mail from Lyle mentioned Shipmate Yacovangelo, a machinist's mate 1/C, from Massachusets, who was in the damage control party and jumped in the water to rescue pilots after they had been shot down. On such occasions, the Sperry was dead on the water, and when she came under attack from Japanese planes, the swimmers' safety lines had to be cut loose. Later on, the ships would go back and pick

them up. Lyle requested the e-mail address for Yacovangelo and another shipmate, Vessia, from B division, who he believes lives in Florida.

Al Ward (8/52-11/53) Al's wife Carol advised us that they are unable to make one of the reunions because he has neuropathy in his feet, and a trip is out of the question. He is too proud to be put in a wheelchair. They wish everyone a great time at the reunion and reminded us that we don't appreciate our health until something hits us.

George Olson ('51-'54) It is always great to hear from George through his e-mails as he keeps us informed about his travels which include Thailand and New Hampshire. He has been able to attend American Legion and VFW meetings and reunions on his trips, but misses making the Sperry reunion. He suggested that April is a very strange month for a reunion because school is in session, it is too cold and other reasons. He proposed that Sperry members consider another time of the year for reunions. He has organized his library and photos of the Sperry, which includes Sperry plane guard duty, refueling and more onto a video tape that he can bring to a reunion if he is able to attend at some point. He also has many color slides of torpedo exercises near Culebra Island in the Caribbean; Bordeaux, France; Andalsnes, Norwa;, Isle of Wight and Plymouth, England; Norfolk, Virginia, and others.
